The first operator at Perth was Mr. J. C. Fleming (the Superintendent),

This line was soldom used for the first few months, but was soon afterwards appreciated, and made available for both business and social purposes (especially the latter), which had not always been the most friendly between the two centres of population.

This short line of telegraph becoming more utilised and appreciated, a company, consisting of about a dozen shareholders, among them being Major Crampton, Mesers. A Cumming. E. Birch. B. Mason, E. Newman, G. 1891. January 7th. Mr. H. E. Clay's 20th Departmental anniversary. 1892. June 30th. Principal offices in Colony to open at 8 s.m. from this date.

1893. June 17th. Mr. F. A. Bailey, Superintendent Telegraphs, died. July 22nd. Coolgardie line opened for traffic; 400 messages passed through.

July 28th Mr. W. J. Hancock, Superintendent Telegraphs, left for Europe on leave of absence

After which date, consequent upon the tremendous inrush of population, and increase of business, through the many new gold finds events so crowd upon one another, as to take up too much room to record. New offices opened weekly, thousands of miles of wire erected, and an enormous traffic over the lines, were the general order of things up till a short while ago, when the Department, having its machinery adequate to core with the business, matters became smooth and easy going once more
